Fly the Red Ensign, a huge success

Our Fly the Red Ensign for Merchant Navy Day annual campaign continued its success this year, with the British Merchant Navy's official flag (Red Ensign) being flown on Merchant Navy Day on September 3rd in many locations across the UK, highlighting the vital role of merchant seafarers – past, present and future.

Started in 2015 by The Seafarers' Charity to address 'sea blindness' that appeared to afflict a huge proportion of the population, the campaign provides an opportunity to honour the many brave men and women who kept the UK afloat during both World Wars, and celebrate our dependence

on modern-day merchant seafarers who are responsible for more than 90% of the UK's imports.

This year, in recognition of extreme financial challenges that many working and retired UK seafarers and their families have been facing during the pandemic, we also asked for donations, as part of the campaign, towards Merchant Navy Fund, as a way of thanking our merchant seafarers who have worked so hard to keep our country going throughout the COVID-19 crisis.

A huge thanks to those of you who have generously supported our campaign already.

A £7,000 grant was awarded to The Not Forgotten

The grant will provide support to 300 former Merchant Navy personnel through recreational and entertainment events and activities to help prevent loneliness and isolation.

Since 2017, The Not Forgotten has increased their reach from 51 Merchant Navy beneficiaries to an expected 300 this year. Based on their achievements throughout the last twelve difficult months, they are confident that their initiatives can continue to make a real difference to Merchant Navy beneficiaries who are experiencing loneliness and find themselves isolated from society.

A planned series of activities and events include summer drivein concerts, cookery courses, fishing trips, weekends away and respite breaks, challenge holidays, activity weeks, dragon boat racing, cycling, Christmas lunches and mini garden parties at care homes and other venues.





In the year ahead, restrictions may mean they will need a plan B or even C in some cases. However, the agility they have showed during the past year demonstrates that they can and will make a difference to the many isolated and lonely beneficiaries who rely on them for support.



This welcome opportunity has helped me enormously with socialising in a safe and comfortable environment without judgement. This has also been a welcome break for my wife who has had to endure over a year of isolation due to my illness.

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A £15,000 grant was awarded to Shipwrecked Mariners' Society

This will support emergency grants to Merchant Navy seafarers and their dependants who are in real poverty but who also do not fit within the organisations' set criteria (e.g. 10 years' sea service).

Applications come in daily from across the country for help with items ranging from rent and rent deposits, stair lifts, winter clothing, replacement window frames, new boilers, replacement white goods, funeral expenses, and priority debts.

COVID-19 has made these requests more frequent, but whilst Shipwrecked Mariners' Society have released their own emergency fund, the criteria still often exclude some who they feel should be supported.

Most of these applicants have no savings or insurance to cushion the blow of unfortunate events such as the failure of a washing machine or boiler in the cold months. Applicants may be retired, on Job Seekers Allowance, Employment and Support Allowance, or indeed in employment but facing financial difficulties, such as eviction because of rent arrears.

Thanks to the Merchant Navy Fund, they have been able to support some people who do not fully meet all their criteria.

We provide financial help to both retired and workingage seafarers and their dependants who are in need...
Since Covid, many have had to rely on Universal Credit for living costs as their income has disappeared. There's a 4 to 6-week wait for many

benefits and we help keep the lights on until they kick in.

A £20,000 grant was awarded to Age UK for The Silver Line

The grant will ensure the continued provision of long running and much needed telephone friendship groups known as Seafarers Link, which connect older seafarers via regular, supervised telephone-conference calls.

These groups aim to help reduce loneliness and isolation and enhance relationships and social interaction by ensuring continued connections with other seafarers and seafaring communities. A vitally important service in the past year when the restrictions of the pandemic meant that they were the only social contact the callers had all week.

The pandemic has had a significant impact on people's loneliness and subsequent mental health, meaning they need greater emotional support, companionship, and reassurance, in addition to the usual friendship and conversation they are seeking.

Now that Seafarers Link is under the Age UK umbrella, there is also a large pool of older people waiting for 1-2-1 friendship. The service has moved from fortnightly calls to weekly to offer vital additional support to the group members during the coronavirus crisis.

Sometimes I just feel like having a chat and there's no one at that time I can phone. Now I've got The Silver Line, I feel I've got a whole lot of new friends and have had some lovely conversations. Where

The grant will help fund the team that supports the calls, including the coordination and technical support, and ensure that the friendship groups continue and develop. The aim is to expand the number of groups currently running each week.

A £1,300 grant has been awarded to the Falklands Veterans Foundation

This grant will enable a Merchant Navy Veteran's granddaughter to accompany her mother, for emotional support, during a visit to the Falkland Islands whose father who was killed in action during the Falkland Islands Conflict.

The Falklands Veterans Foundation was the first UK-based charity for Falklands Veterans and their immediate families and is committed to providing a network of support and direction for those in need. They work in partnership with other service charities and organisations to aid Falklands Veterans and their families.

In 2019, a Merchant Navy Fund grant to the Falklands Veterans Foundation enabled Lucene Hughes, the daughter of a Merchant Seaman killed in action during the Falklands Conflict, to visit the islands with a companion. Now, the daughter of a Merchant Seaman, who was also killed in the Conflict, is hoping to visit the Falkland Islands in 2022.

A £15,000 grant was awarded to Sailors' Children's Society

This forms part of a larger grant of £75,000 which will support children and young people from Merchant Navy families on low incomes with essentials such as school uniforms, winter coats and shoes, school trips, educational equipment and more.

Families often turn to the Society following a traumatic event such as bereavement, loss, or diagnosis of a life-changing illness. The society provides assistance via its Family Support scheme with financial, emotional and practical elements until the family is again self-sufficient or until the children have left full time education.

Each family receives a small monthly grant towards the children's activities, or towards food, heating, or clothing such shoes and a new school uniform, or a coat in the winter.

This grant will support approximately 205 children and young people out of the 727 they are already supporting. It is a 62% increase on the number of families they were helping pre-covid.

The Society's aim now is to allow children to be children as they adjust to the new circumstances and encourage the family to become more independent again.

The Seafarers' Charity has also partnered with a national charity, Relate, to offer relationship support and counselling for UK-based Merchant Navy families and we are keen on promoting this service to our readers.

- Children and young people's counselling
- Bereavement and loss counselling
- Separation and divorce counselling


